Dear Monsignor Christian:

This is a response to our conversation on February 17, 1993 concerning a priest of your diocese by the name of Father Wilfred Bombardier. The nature of the conversation pertained to sexual allegations made against Fr. Wilfred Bombardier while he served as a priest at Saint Charles Parish in Albuquerque, New Mexico.

The first reported victim was place. It was the years 1966 to about 1970. The abuse took place over several years. The place of the abuse was a cabin in the mountains and also it took place in an area off from the altar of the church and in the rectory as well. It is reported by that the actual abuse took place in front of the Consecrated Host, but addid not elaborate on that point. The sexual abuse consisted of fondling, kissing, and attempted sodomy. Indicated that he does not need counseling. It did affect his sexual identity and I feel, however, that he has worked out the problems. The mother has severe guilt because of the fact that she did encourage to associate with Fr. Bombardier. The family heard of this sexual abuse through a hairdresser and in turn, over a dinner table. This was a tremendous shock when the family first heard of this incident. The mother did contact Fr. Bombardier in Manchester, New Hampshire. He admitted to the mother the sexual abuse. There is no legal action pending.

The second incident pertains to a laims that he was sexually abusea sometime during the period 1966 - 1967. eports that he was 8 years old at the take and an altar boy at St. Charles Church. The sexual abuse took place over several months and also occurred in the sacristy of the church. It is reported by hat the priest kissed him and fondled him several times nat sexual advances took place again at this remove cabin in the church. It is also reported by indicated that oral sex took place on himself. There was no anal penetration. claims that there were many visits to this cabin. indicates that he told his parents about the sexual abuse only five years ago. as since divorced. He had alcohol abuse treatment. He has mine: drug problems and he is definitely worried about "sexual addiction." indicates that at the present time he has problems relating to women. I am not sure about any legal action that may be pending tencerning He was in a state of great agitation. This may be a case for litigation, but only time will tell.

Dear Father Wolf:

I write in summary of our telephone conversation of yesterday regarding my meeting with Father Wilfrid Bombardier over the allegations of child abuse in the period of 1966-70, while he was stationed in St. Charles Parish in Alburquerque.

In the matter involving been to the cabin with him on one occasion with two other boys, one of them being a little was some wrestling between the boys which occurred, and that on one occasion he and wrestled. When he fell to the ground fell on top of him, and he "gave up". He then put his arms around hugged him. A second attempt to hug him while in the same position met with resistance from who might have felt that Father Bombardier was becoming too familiar. Father claims that he had no ill intent in mind. This event took place in 1969.

In a meeting with mother in Manchester in 1971, he admitted to this indiscretion, although it is possible that she thought he was admitting to more because the specifics of her charges were not clearly discussed. Father Bombardier claims that nothing else ever happened before or after this incident.

In regard to the allegation of everything. Was an altar boy in the parish, but Father Bombardier claims that he never was at the cabin with him. He denies any sexual molestation or any physical contact with with the exception of friendly hugs in the sacristy of the church before or after serving Mass.

When I impressed upon Father Bombardier the importance of total honesty if the Church is to be of assistance to him, he admitted some sexual difficulties he had over the years in some specific detail. He absolutely denies, however, the allegations made by and Obviously, it is possible that Father Bombardier is either lying or blocking and any proven information that you uncover will certainly be of great importance to the Diocese of Manchester.

We have certainly found in this Diocese that providing this type of information to victims of clergy abuse has furthered our efforts to settle threatened and potential claims. We urge you to cooperate in this endeavor by providing the family with the reassurances that they currently seek.

Dear Atty. Kennedy:

In response to your letter of October 25th, in reference to Father Wilfrid Bombardier, I am pleased to provide you with the following response of the Diocese of Manchester to the allegations raised against him by

- a. After being informed by Father Ron Wolf, Chancellor of the Archdiocese of Santa Fee, of the allegations against Father Wilfrid Bombardier, I had a personal lengthy meeting with Father Bombardier who admitted to improperly hugging and touching in late 1969, at a cabin outside of Albuquerque. Father Bombardier was truly ashamed of this indiscretion and indicated his sorrow for it in a conversation with mother in Manchester in 1971. Father Bombardier claimed to me that he had not been improperly involved with anyone for more than twenty years.
- b. I told Father Bombardier that the Diocese must have proper oversight in regard to this problem, and that as a result I would need to share everything with Father Peter Dumont, the pastor of Guardian Angel Parish in Berlin, where Father Bombardier lives as a retired priest and provides occasional help in sacramental ministry in the parish.
 - I shared in detail the allegations raised, and was assured by Father Dumont that while Father Bombardier currently has no ministerial or social contact with the youth of the parish, he would certainly exercise thorough oversight in this regard, and would hold Father Bombardier accountable for anything that would put him in harm's way.
- c. I also told Father Bombardier that he would be required to visit with Dr. Michael Noonan, a psychologist utilized by the Diocese for priests with problems, to be sure that he understood his past indiscretions and was no longer a risk of any sort to any other young person. I provided Dr. Noonan with all the pertinent background information for his meetings with Father Bombardier.

As of this date, given Father Bombardier's openness and contrition about his past problems and with the oversight situations in place, I am confident that the limited ministry Father Bombardier is performing does not place any young people at risk.

Trusting that this information is helpful to you, and assuring you of my willingness to be of any further assistance I can, I am

In response to a telephone conversation with Father Ron Wolf, the Chancellor of the Archdiocese of Santa Fe (cf Fax enclosed), I met on February 23rd, 1993, with Father Wilfrid Bombardier. In the course of our conversation Father Bombardier admitted the following facts.


- a. He had some sporadic problems with self abuse during his seminary days, but no other sexual problems.
- b. While he was stationed as a Blessed Sacrament Father in the Philippines he had a short term relationship with a Philipino man about 30, and admits to mutual masturbation with him on two or three occasions.
- In the late 1960s, while stationed as a Blessed Sacrament Father in Albuquerque, he admits to taking some young men to the cabin owned by the community, and on one or two occasions wrestling with them, which brought them into close bodily contact, e.g., lying on top of one another. At the end of such wrestling bouts he admits to giving a hug to which apparently misunderstood, and he stopped. In 1971, when confronted in Manchester by mother, a native of Manchester who was visiting her relatives here, he admitted to his indiscretion although it appears that she believed he was admitting to something more.
- d. He admits as well to being familiar, e.g., hugging, kissing, fondling one boy in Manchester in 1975, whom he had known when he was stationed at St. Patrick's and whom he visited on one or two occasions in Manchester after being stationed at Sacred Heart Parish in Laconia. He says he quickly brought a halt to this behavior and this young man is now married and living some place in Massachusetts.

I told Father Bombardier I would share the pertinent parts of this information with Father Wolf in Albuquerque, and that he in turn would share it with the family.

I told Father Bombardier that it would be necessary for us to divulge all of this information to Father Peter Dumont, the pastor of Guardian Angel Parish in Berlin, with whom he was living, to assure appropriate oversight. I also told him that it would be necessary for him to meet with Dr. Michael Noonan of the Clergy Counseling Service, to make sure that Father Bombardier had truly come to grips with this behavior and was no longer a danger to anyone.

Father Bombardier agreed to these conditions.

Dear Rev. Christian,

I am writing to you after much debate and struggle within myself. I have tried to lay to rest much of the past regarding the abuse I suffered as a pre-teen, but feel the need to bring to your attention, my thoughts concerning this matter. I have read your letter responding to my parents attorney's letter dated November 2, 1993 and feel I need to share openly the fear, frustration and the struggle I underwent because of Fr. Bombardier repeated sexual advances and abuse during the years of my association with him.

In your letter, you stated the Father Bombardier admits to improperly touching me outside of the cabin in late 1969. It sounds to me like a feeble attempt to admit that something went on, but nothing major. I reported to Fr. Wolf in detail on the many sexual encounters that Fr. Bombardier and I had; from genital fondling, french kissing, attempting anal sex with me on several occasions, playing nude games, etc...

Because of the sexual encounters with Fr. Bombardier, I have had to struggle internally for most of my life with my own sexual identity and activity. I have feared that within myself, there is a "monster within" that might explode with little or slight provication to abuse my own children or someone elses. You've heard the many reports that those who were abused, most likely will abuse someone else. You have no idea how hard it is to raise three daughters fearing that I might do something improper with them or even to be accused at some later date. Every time one of them has sat in my lap or ask for a back rub, I think of the damage of my innocence. It has been very difficult to enjoy the sexual development of my own children.





Fr. Bombardier abused my love for the church, for him in the authority figure over my love and abused the love of our family. I think that there needs more to be said and done by Fr. Bombardier than a weak admission that something happen that is barely worth mentioning. Every time I turn on the TV and here of another sexual abuse case by a Catholic priest, I relive the pain and agony of the abuse. The fact that it has never been resolved adds to the pain.

I am surprised to the fact that Fr. Bombardier is still alive and functioning in some capacity in the church. I thought he might have died by the time this came into the open. I am 38 years old now and in the service of our Lord Jesus Christ and I feel the Fr. Bombardier needs to make personal contrition to me and to our Holy Father in Heaven.

I trust you will pass this information onto Fr. Bombardier for I do expect a reply and acknowledgment from the both of you. Please write to me at my home address:



Please excuse the delay in my response to your letter of March 5th. With the various demands of the Lenten Season I have been somewhat tardy in my correspondence.

May I begin by stating that I understand fully the pain and the personal struggle that Father Bombardier's abuse of your trust has caused you over the years. I understand in a special way the stress it has put on your relationships with your own children. I am sincerely sorry that a priest of the Church was responsible for so much difficulty in your life. I can only pray that the Lord with His healing power will enable you to find peace and wholeness in the days and months ahead.

I have been in touch with Father Bombardier, and suggested that he write to you. I believe that you will be hearing from him in the very near future. Based on my personal conversations with him and on the consultations I have had with the psychologist to whom we referred him last year after becoming aware of the problems you broght to the attention of the Archdiocese of Santa Fe, I can honestly state that I believe Father Bombardier fully comprehends the gravity of what he did to you, and that he is sincerely repentant. Obviously, he is now under careful monitoring in the very limited ministry that he does. Frankly, he is now a very old man with somewhat failing mental capacities, who, I believe, daily carries the shame of his earlier problems. I hope that you will experience some of what I am saying in whatever letter he writes to you.

In closing, I again assure you of my prayers for your personal healing, and my gratefulness to you for making us aware of Father Bombardier's problems so that we could be sure that they are not ongoing and that no other young people would be victimized.



On January 25th and 26th, 1995, I spoke respectively with Sister Denise Therriault and Father Arthur Pare in regard to Father Wilfrid Bombardier who, on January 25th, took up residence in St. Kieran House.

I notified them of Father Bombardier's history in regard to sexual abuse, and told them that while we are confident that there has been no repetition of these problems for many years, it was still necessary to monitor him. Specifically, he should not be allowed to keep company with minors in the house, and particularly in his room. Furthermore, should they become aware of his developing any kind of friendship with a young person, they should confront him with that fact and notify the Diocese.

Sister Denise and Father Pare indicated that Father Bombardier had already shared with them his past problems and knew that they would be assisting him in this sort of monitoring process.
